ELEPHANTS IN CAPTIVITY

During the Sixth Form Open Evening last week, I was reminded of a favourite story of mine - one about elephants in captivity. Captive elephants are often tied by a chain to a small stake. It is obvious that these powerful animals could easily break the chain or uproot the stake; the elephants can break free at any time, but for some reason, they do not. I discovered that when the elephants are very young and much smaller, their captors use a small chain and small stake to keep them captive, and at such a young age, the flimsy chain and stake is enough to hold them. At first the small elephants try to walk off, but eventually they learn that such efforts are futile, so stop trying. Even when they grow strong enough to break free – they do not. The elephants think they know they are trapped so they never try to break free again. The real binding is not physical but mental.

Like the elephant, many people spend their lives believing that there are things that they can't do because they failed at it once or had a bad experience. Here at EBS, we encourage students out of their comfort zone and support them to realise that with motivation, hard work and resilience, (sprinkled with a little kindness), anything is possible. A sprinkling of EBS kindness was reported to me this week: a local doctor called the school to inform us that three of our students helped an elderly lady who had fallen and called an ambulance for her. The doctor informed us that without the pupils' assistance the lady would be in a much more serious situation, but she is making a speedy recovery. We often hear of young people being a nuisance in today's society, but we are proud of the positive actions our students take.

The company has a long and illustrious history as a world renowned Literary Agency representing many of the most famous figures of the literary and political world throughout the twentieth century including Winston Churchill, John Steinbeck, Samuel Beckett, AA Milne and DH Lawrence. Many great authors have passed through the portal of Curtis Brown in their careers, and many of these remain clients to this day. EBS was extremely lucky to secure such a prestigious speaker for our Year 10s, 12s and 13s through the charity <u>Speakers For Schools</u>.

Jonny's speech was very inspiring covering the work of a Literary Agent as well as general tips about working in the creative industries. Literary agents represent authors and sell authors' books to publishers. They also represent TV programmes and musical theatre as well as actors. Jonny received 150,000 manuscript novels in the post last year, but obviously not all were suitable to be published. His job is to spot those that might make it! A debut novel could be worth £5000 to £500,000. We were told that 190,000 books were published last year in the UK and that adults generally read 5-10 books every year.
