CHRISTMAS COLLECTION

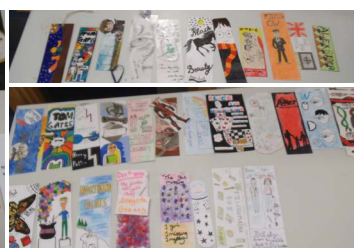
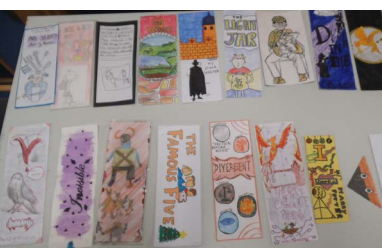

BBC BROADCASTER SPEAKS TO STUDENTS



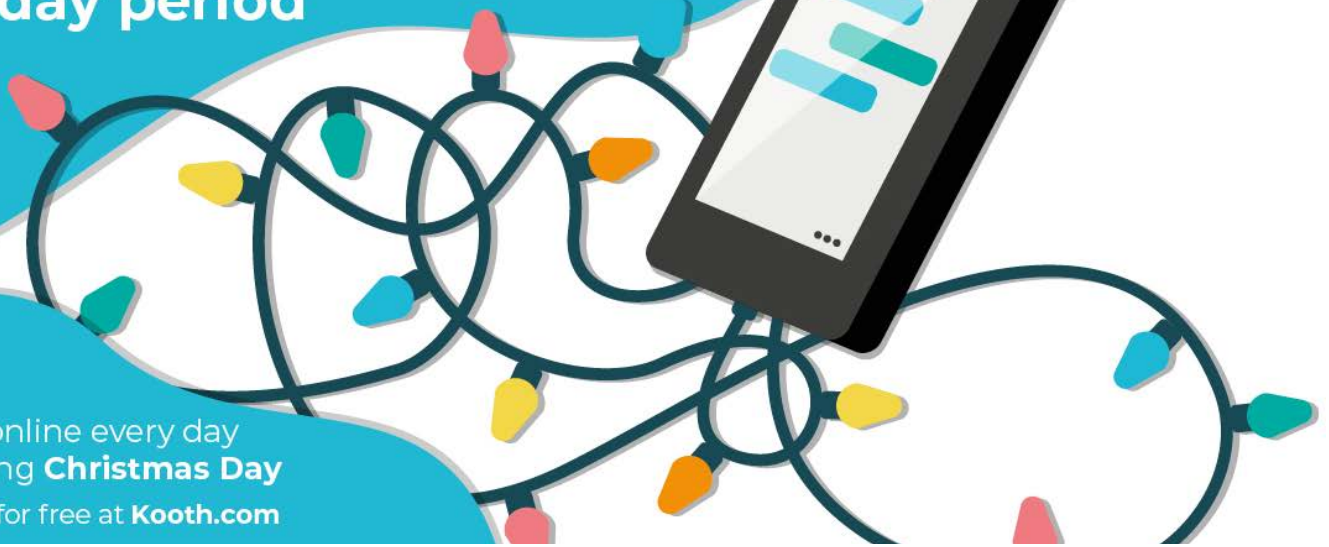
On Thursday 10th December a group of Year 12 Business Studies and English students were fortunate to attend a virtual talk by Joe Lynam. Joe is a respected broadcaster and moderator who was the BBC's senior Business Correspondent for a decade. He now presents the current affairs show *The Newsroom* on BBC Radio 4 and the World Service. He has won many awards for his original journalism including the 2018

Headline Money Award for his BBC1 exposé of how RBS treated many of its own business customers and the *Wincott Prize* for Journalism in 2016. Prior to his talk, Joe had been broadcasting on the BBC into the early hours on Boris Johnson's trip to Brussels to negotiate a Brexit trade deal. In his talk Joe spoke about his journey into broadcasting and how he undertook a number of other jobs before he decided to follow his passion and seek a career in broadcasting. He faced many set-backs along the way, including damning criticism from his own boss early in his BBC career. Unwilling to let this derail him from his aspirations, Joe used this as motivation and went on to become one of the most respected Business Journalists in broadcasting. He explained to students that sometimes in your career (and in life) you have to take one step back to move forwards as he did when joining the BBC at the bottom of the ladder, having previously worked in Irish broadcasting. He spoke about the importance of seeking a career that you will enjoy and the importance of building up a network of friends and family. He also encouraged students to build themselves a reputation for getting things done. Our students were then given the opportunity to ask Joe questions. These ranged from "what will happen if there is no trade deal negotiated with the EU?" to "What news platforms are best for students to gain a balanced viewpoint on current affairs?" Joe answered further questions on Sir Phillip Green's business interests, fake news and how panicked he was when his wife gave birth to his son in the front seat of his car! It was a great experience for our students and we are hoping Joe will return in the new year to inspire more students at EBS.
