ATTENDANCE / APPOINTMENTS

Appointments should be made outside of school hours, if this is not possible, please email absence@eastbarnetschool. com with a your child's name, form and evidence of the appointment. Your child may only be excused from lessons for the duration of the appointment and should return to school immediately afterwards. Every student wishing to leave early must have a confirmation letter from the appointment or a signed note from a parent/carer, to be excused from lessons. Students are also required to inform the Attendance Officer when they are leaving and sign in and out at reception on departure and arrival. Appointments can only be authorised once medical evidence is provided. When reporting your child's absence please report via the school website or call 020 8344 2100 and select option 1, clearly stating your child's full name, form group and reason for absence before 8:00am. You must call and report absences for each day they are off. Lateness: If your child arrives to school once the gate is locked at 8:45am they will receive a late mark, if they arrive after 9:30am they will be coded as 'U' meaning late after registration is closed.

Mr Boast has worked at EBS for many years, and recently celebrated his 70th birthday. He was instrumental in setting up our now amazing workshops and due to his continuous hunting for anything useful that could be obtained free or for very little money he has increased the amount of machinery and equipment we have so that now our workshops are the envy of every state school in the country. He has a reputation beyond EBS as a technician who knows everything there is to know about the job, and if he doesn't know he will find out, hence he is contacted by other schools for his advice which he gives freely.

In school, Mr Boast goes above and beyond. He helps the environment and our finances by recycling wood from pallets which makes some of our projects, as well as finding any other materials that companies or individuals no longer want. He puts in hours of time to help build sets and props for our drama performances, including a pedal car for 'Bugsy Malone' and the convent backdrop for 'Sister Act.' He will fix, repair, and build anything and he will do it properly. Throughout Covid he built sneeze screens and other items that allowed the school to run in a socially distanced manner. This is why staff and students alike turn to Mr Boast, rather than buy new.

Students come and go at EBS and without fail, if they have studied any D&T to GCSE or A-Level they will all agree that Mr Boast is a legend! He will help students with every type of making, set up machines for them, prepare materials for them and advise them about their work. He has stayed in school with staff until as late as 7pm to help students nearing their coursework deadlines and he does this for one reason only - he is a thoroughly decent, kind and incredibly helpful person. Students have said he is the "Core of the D&T Department", "always has a smile on his face [...] he does jobs in the school that no-one else will" and "he helps everyone". I was very lucky to be invited to speak alongside many influential figures, and I hope that my work with the trust continues!
